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Michigan Health Endowment Fund commits more than \$10 million to nutrition and health projects across the state

LANSING, Mich. – 54 organizations will receive a share of \$10 million from the Michigan Health Endowment Fund (Health Fund). Spanning from Southeast Michigan to the corners of the Upper Peninsula, and including Michigan's biggest cities as well as its rural communities, the awards are part of two Health Fund programs: Nutrition & Healthy Lifestyles, which focuses on projects that benefit children, and Community Health Impact, which supports local solutions to health challenges. Michigan is the second-most agriculturally diverse state in the country, but the state struggles with healthy nutrition: childhood obesity rates have more than tripled in the past 30 years, and Michigan has one of the top ten highest rates of obesity at 32.5%. At the same time, the state's food insecurity rate is above the national average, with more than 18% of children lacking consistent access to the healthy foods they need.

"Michigan has the right ingredients to help kids and families live healthy lives and thrive, and we're thrilled to partner with organizations bringing that goal to fruition," explained Laurie Solotorow, senior program officer for the Nutrition & Healthy Lifestyles program. "We're supporting projects that will impact food systems and thus have the potential to be transformative," Solotorow said.

The 18 awards, including 11 new grants and 7 renewals, range from \$100,000 to \$500,000. Common themes in this initiative include creating a culture of health, food as medicine, and school-based programs.

For example, the Fair Food Network will receive \$500,000 for a statewide expansion of Double Up Food Bucks, a program that encourages SNAP users to purchase more fresh fruits and vegetables. Michigan State University will receive \$500,000 to assess fruit and vegetable "prescriptions" for children and families in Flint. The Beaumont Health Foundation will receive \$445,890 to implement a "Whole School, Whole Community" approach to foster healthy environments at home and school.

The Community Health Impact program supports local responses to health challenges with grants up to \$100,000. The 39 awardees in this category include the Alpena Area Senior Citizens Council, Inc., which will receive \$100,000 to expand Project Student Gourmet, an intergenerational partnership that generates youth interest in food careers while providing nutritious and creative meals for older adults. Kalamazoo Community Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services will receive \$100,000 to implement a post-deployment adaptive parenting program for military families. Little Brothers Friends of the Elderly will receive \$97,406 to reduce social isolation and loneliness among older adults in Marquette County through a volunteer team approach.

"The Health Fund believes that communities know best what their residents need to live healthy and vibrant lives, said Health Fund Grants Manager Megan Murphy. "Our Community Health Impact program supports innovative solutions in every corner of the state, many with the potential for expansion or replication if successful."

 Bucks participants to purchase more fruits and vegetables, encouraging more SNAP
 users to take advantage of Double Up Food Bucks, and integrating the program as an
 electronic benefit.
- Kids' Food Basket: From Hunger Relief to Nutrition Education and Access | \$200,000
 Kids' Food Basket (KFB) will use 9.5 acres of farmland as a food hub to support an infrastructure for a local, healthy and fresh food movement targeted at children and their families.
- Marquette-Alger-RESA: Pe-NUT Expansion Phase III | \$249,285
 P.E.P. Phase III will expand nutrition education programming to serve additional schools that do not qualify for SNAP-Ed funded PE-Nut programming, and expand the "Healthy Hero" punch card grocery store program across five additional counties.
- Michigan State University Food as Medicine for Older Adults with Chronic Health
 Conditions | \$500,000
 - MSU will develop a sustainable model for improving food access and nutritional status

of older adults in the northwest region of Michigan's lower peninsula by providing nutritional services after hospital discharge and enhanced transfer of care to community-based programs.

Michigan State University: Innovative Nutrition Practices in Pediatric Health Care:

Assessment of Fruit and Vegetable Prescriptions for Children and Families in Need |

\$500,000

This project will expand the successful fruit and vegetable prescription program piloted in the Hurley Children's Clinic (HCC) to an additional pediatric clinic in Flint that serves approximately 3000 children each year and evaluate its impact on food security, food access, and dietary patterns of children. The proposed project also includes the expansion of Flint Kids Cook, a cooking and nutrition class for children at the Flint Farmers Market, beyond patients of HCC.

- Playworks Education Energized: Growing Safe and Healthy Play in Michigan | \$500,000
 Playworks will build their organizational capacity to help school districts across Michigan develop structured play programs that are innovative, scalable, and sustainable.
- ProMedica Bixby Hospital: ProMedica Veggie Mobile | \$333,658
 To reduce obesity and related chronic conditions in Lenawee County, this project will expand a mobile produce market, work with convenience stories to stock more healthy food, and work with the Boys & Girls Club of Lenawee County to improve supplemental meals in schools.
- Spectrum Health Foundation: Spectrum Health Culinary Medicine | \$499,943
 To transform care delivery to underserved at-risk youth and their families, Spectrum
 Health Foundation will expand their professional culinary medicine program to resident physicians and healthcare workers and conduct a family culinary medicine program.
- YMCA of Greater Grand Rapids: YMCA Healthy Corner Store Initiative | \$170,665
 By engaging YMCAs across the state, this project will help communities build neighborhood food systems that are healthy, affordable, and accessible for low-income residents in up to six communities defined by the USDA as having low food access.

 - The U.P. Health Project will develop a coordinated system of support to improve student health in elementary and middle schools throughout the U.P. with a focus on special education students.
