CALL TO ORDER

The board meeting of the Michigan Health Endowment Fund was called to order at 1:30 pm by Chair Kathy Boles.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES FROM THE PREVIOUS MEETINGS

Ms. Boles welcomed and introduced new board member Leila Kello. Ms. Boles outlined the agenda for the meeting.

CEO REPORT

Mr. Hajra introduced the new Health Fund staff and reported on the recent convenings hosted by the Health Fund. Mr. Hajra outlined the proposed timeline for the Health Fund 2026 strategic plan and provided an update on the approach to policy engagement with legislators.

GRANTMAKING COMMITTEE

Ms. Hussein reported that the Grantmaking Committee met to review Community Health Impact and Maternal and Infant Health proposals. The committee recommended 20 proposals and \$2.6 million in funding for the Community Health Impact grants. Program Manager, Veronica Marchese, described the CHI grantmaking strategies, outlined the review process and presented the proposals. Listed below are the recommended proposals. Ms. Kello indicated a conflict of interest with the proposal from the Chaldean Community Foundation. Mr. Veenstra moved to approve these grant recommendations; Mr. Williams seconded the motion.

The motion passed 8-0.

Ms. Jacobs reported that the Grantmaking Committee met to review off-cycle Healthy Aging proposals. The committee recommended 5 proposals and \$2 million in funding. Ms. Sederburg presented the proposals. Ms. Hussein reported a conflict with the proposal from the Regents of the University of Michigan. Ms. Kello moved to approve these grant recommendations; Ms. Boyd seconded the motion.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Mr. Veenstra reported on the March 2024 financial statements. He reported that the annual audit is in process and staff will review a draft of the audited financial statements in June. The audit committee will review the audit in July and make a recommendation to the board at the September board meeting. Ms. Karaboyas reported that the annual Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan contribution of \$100 million was received and immediately invested. The Investment Committee met and recommended a modification to the Statement of Investment Policy to allow investments in a new asset class. Mr. Veenstra moved to approve a revised Statement of Investment Policy and Ms. Hussein seconded the motion.

The motion passed 8-0.

COMMITTEE ASSIGNMENTS

Mr. Williams discussed a recommendation from the Executive Committee for committee assignments for Ms. Chen-Zhang and Ms. Kello. The Executive Committee recommends Ms. Chen-Zhang serve the grantmaking committee focused on Community Health Impact, Maternal & Infant Health, and Nutrition & Healthy Lifestyles and Ms. Kello serve the grantmaking committee for Behavioral Health, Healthy Aging, and Special Projects and Emerging Ideas. The Executive Committee also recommended appointing Ms. Chen-Zhang to the Audit Committee and Investment Committee. There are no changes to the February
